Three hours drive from Durban, iMfolozi Game Reserve is situated between the White and Black iMfolozi Rivers. It is the oldest proclaimed natural park in Africa and is renowned for its Big Five population, more than 400 bird species as well as its white rhino conservation program of which the WLS founder, Ian Player is synonymous.
