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Trails are conducted in the vast freshwater wetland of the Okavango Delta. Fed by the floodwaters from Angola, it is a wilderness teeming with seasonal and permanent wildlife. The trail makes use of mokoro's (indigenous dug out canoes) to ease the trailists along the waterways. Our trails go deep into the heart of the Okavango, giving trailists a unique insight into this river system and the animals that thrive in these conditions.

The area is home to hippo, Nile crocodile, lion, giraffe and zebra. Leopard and wild dog feature high on visitors' list of desirable sightings as are the fleeting lechwe which are endemic to the swamp areas of Africa. Trails are accompanied by the distinctive cry of the fish eagle and night watch is often accompanied by the roar of lions. The breathtaking beauty and uniqueness of this wild area allows the trailists time to reflect on their busy lives and relationships and also encourages them to recognise the awe of nature while alive to the thrill of the wildness around them.

Led by highly experienced and professional WLS guides, assisted by a local guide, a wilderness trail is a must on your bucket list.

Friends and family, Dads and daughters, moms and sons, business colleagues, students and leadership development groups— the trail has a deep meaning for all who experience it and for many it subtly shifts our consciousness to adapt to a lighter tread on our fragile planet.

Trails are met at Maun International Airport where equipment is distributed to all trailists. Depending on the time of year, the trail then leaves by boat or vehicle for the Okavango Delta. The first night is spent deep in the Okavango, in the Moremi Game Reserve.
